The Medina High School Ag Education Department and the Medina FFA raise alpacas and llamas on campus as part of their fiber-based program. Students have the opportunity to not only experience the fiber industry, but also take an active role in its entirety. (*They also have raised or currently raise angora rabbits, Pygora goats, and sheep for comparison purposes.*)

At Medina, students are responsible, under the instruction of Todd Eick, for raising the animals, harvesting fiber, creating products, marketing, and ultimately selling their handmade products. As a member of EAA, Mr. Eick uses their resources to further develop the program and educate his students. Students participate in leadership events promoting alpaca fiber and participate at markets throughout the summer. At markets, they often take animals with them to better explain to customers about the alpacas, and can visually educate the difference between lamas. They have also participated in the annual "Showtacular" where students set up an educational display showcasing their production of various products and help to educate the general public; they are looking forward to being part of this fall's event again!

Through grants, fundraising, and sales of products, the FFA Chapter has been able to acquire several different types of equipment that students are able to learn on, animals to improve genetics, and yarn from EAA. They have also bought raw material to make their own handling equipment, skirting tables, and looms.

Students learn everything from nutrition and fecal exams to general husbandry practices to processing fiber to finished products. They can also choose to focus on any part of the process and further develop skills in that area.

Students at Medina have the opportunity to experience a working process from the very beginning (they have begun their breeding program) to the very end. The Medina FFA fiber-based program (primarily alpaca) is slowly growing and being recognized throughout the

community. In the future, they hope to have animals to show and want to be able to offer agritourism as another means of raising funds and educating the public.

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Fiber Testing

SGS in New Zealand purchased the Yocom-McColl fiber testing equipment and business. They are now doing the fiber testing for the EPD program.

Fleece Testing is the testing of samples from individual animals for breeding selection purposes. Tests available include Micron (average diameter), Staple length and strength, length-diameter profile, and yield, with simple online payment by credit card. https://onlineservices.sgs.com/nz/alpaca-fleece-flock-testing/AFTLFT

Key benefits

Independent Sampling and Testing:

- 1. Provides certainty in quality and quantity for both the buyer and seller.
- 2. Gives valuable information on how to process the fiber efficiently for the processor.
- 3. Allows wool users to direct the fiber into the products for which it is best suited.

How to understand your test results

Yield - Determining the amount of clean fiber

Mean fiber diameter-The average fineness of the fiber (fiber thickness), which is a primary determinant of fiber value

Fiber curvature- Relates to bulk, compressibility, and crimp and is cited as an influence on processing

Fiber diameter distribution-Information about aspects of the diameter distribution may affect assessments of comfort and processing performance

Diameter-length profile- Measuring the average diameter at increments along the length of fiber staples may be important for managing sheep flocks and, in the future, may assist in predicting processing performance

Length and Strength-Provides data for estimating the processed length of tops produced from the fiber

Follow these easy steps to get your sample tested!

- 1. Request testing required and receive information on sampling procedures and sample sizes required
- 2. Pay testing fees by credit card
- 3. Post samples for testing to SGS in New Zealand
- 4. Testing performed
- 5. Electronic reports are generated and sent direct to your email or faxed on request
