



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Government Working With People— Montana Department of Livestock

Ad placements in the Galloway Press resulted in several inquires from Galloway breeders in Wyoming. But they ran into a snag when Wyoming considered placing Yaks under control of the Wyoming Game and Fish Department. Thanks to Tom Harrower, Kemmerer, Wyoming for communicating this to me. I made a quick call to Dr. Donald P. Ferlicka, Administrator-State Veterinarian of Animal Health Division, Montana State Department of Livestock. Dr. Ferlicka arranged a conference call with the Wyoming Livestock Department and the Wyoming Game and Fish Department which resulted in Yaks being classified as domestic cattle for purposes of import to the state of Wyoming. An honest victory for Yak breeders maintaining our free trade zone. Thank you Dr. Ferlicka.

NOTE A: Also established in 1993 unofficially the Montana Department of Livestock holds Yaks as exempt from Montana Brand inspection. Further at this point in time, Brucellosis vaccination is not approved nor required for Yaks in Montana and we can continue to operate under our present testing procedure.

NOTE B: It is very important to keep in touch with your State Department of Livestock about requirements applying to your livestock. **

The IYAK Board of Directors were elected as follows:


President, Jerry McRoberts, Gurley,

The orders aren't rushing in yet, but a North Powder rancher is raising the "new wave" for cattle: yaks.

Yes, yaks.

"It is as good as good beef. And it's no joke. This stuff cooks like steak. The hamburger is great," said Dan Thee, who has raised a small herd of Tibetan creatures along the North Powder River for about a year.

Thee recently sent a bull through the Mountain Center Livestock Market in LA Grande, just to expose cattle growers to yaks. And while interest has not yet taken off, Thee said crossbreeds of cattle and yaks will produce a leaner beef, with less cholesterol and less marbling.


"People aren't really ready to eat yak," Thee said. "People will like something that's a little more familiar. That's why the crossbreeds are so important."

Thee bought his herd, which now numbers nine females and one bull, from a ranch in Montana. But yaks originate from the high plateaus of Tibet and were first domesticated 1,000 years before Christ.

Their high-elevation breeding has made them hardy creatures; yaks have more red blood cells, which enable them to absorb more oxygen in the thinner atmosphere they're used to. They have dense coats and thick hides with a soft underdown to protect them from the frigid temperatures of their homeland.

"I give them no shelter, nothing more than what they have here," Thee said, pointing to an open field.

At 16,000 feet, with temperature at 20 below and whiteout conditions, the yaks don't seem to mind. "They'll just go sit there and tuck in for a few days, and they won't eat a thing," Thee said.

"They're actually more thrifty than cattle," he added, pointing out that yaks eat less than cows and store energy in their shoulder hump.

"This grass is better than they're used to in Tibet," he said. "I saw that hump grow all winter," Thee said.

Thee's yaks are purebred black yaks. His bull, nicknamed Bill, stands about five feet tall at his shoulder hump, with a set of horns about 45 inches across, spreading outward and upward. Both males and females have horns. Bill's

horns, however, are so wide that Thee cannot put him through his cattle chute, even though the other animals pass through the chute normally.

"I can kind of walk him in by myself. .
. They kind of get the drift of it," the rancher said.

Smaller on average than cattle, a female yak weights between 450 to 650 pounds, while a bull can grow to half a ton. Despite their size, they're faster than cattle, running with their tails sticking up over their backs. Crossbreeds could make

good roping stock. Thee said.

"See how frisky he can be— look at him! He's as frisky as the little ones," Thee said while watching Bill gallop back toward the rest of the herd.

Thee said his animals are quite docile—the Tibetans train their yaks as beasts of burden, often using them as pack animals and for milk and wool production.

In fact, Thee calls yaks the original domesticated cow. The Chinese bred yaks with cows and got creatures that had more milk, better meat and excellent work habits.

The tail of the yak was once a valued possession for Indian and Tibetan royalty, Thee said. Long and with a shaggy fringe, they were used as fly whisks and prized like lion skins. Thee isn't the only rancher in the United States who has turned to rasing yaks, but there aren't many more. Of the 400 yak in the country, the largest herd (250 head) is located in Nebraska. Thee said three ranchers own about 80 percent of the stock, while about a dozen own the rest.

"I'm real pleased to have a herd like this," he said. "We really enjoy them. They're really easygoing. They eat hay right out of your hand," Thee said.

"We can take what little we have and work on a breeding program that can go into the future," he said.

Editorial Comments:

And then further even his Yak are confused as to whether they came from Montana or Tibet. I quote Dan, "This grass is better than they're used to in Tibet." he said. "I saw that hump grow all winter." And this is the final point, Dan must be a new aristrocrat with nothing to do but watch his bulls' humps grow during winter.

By now, this must sound like I don't like Dan Thee. Not really. We're just having a little fun. Dan is a great guy and a great Yakker. Dan has added a lot of fun to the Yak industry over the last year. His wife Karen is a sweetheart and together they are a great addition to our expanding network of Yak breeders and promoters. Good luck Dan and Karen with your new venture to breed ultra wooly type Yaks, but please keep them down below 16,000 feet. The rare air can be confusing to man and beast alike. LGR

North American Yak Registry

The Board of Directors of the International Yak Association formed September 27, 1993 at the KwaTaqNuk Resort were chartered to form the North American Yak Registry and appoint a Director or Registrar of the Registry.

The resulting North American Yak Registry Board:

Dr. Dane Smith, Lawrence G. Richards, Brad Sprouse, Susan Heath, Lloyd Hiebert.

Dane Smith and Larry Richards spent many long winter nights on the telephone debating and hammering out a viable registration system. When the final framework was approved by the Board of IYAK, Dane Smith implemented all the paperwork to put the Registry into motion. Throughout the proceedings, Larry Richards, argued for terminology consistent with the purebred cattle registries of the high powered European Cattle breeds such as Sale and Piedmontese cattle. His rationale was to make the Yak Registry consistent with the major cattle breeds, thereby gaining respect and possible marketing crossover from cattlemen. Accordingly, a Full-blood Yak Registry was started in 1993. And a separate percentage Yak registry. In the percentage registry, animals reaching 15/16 status are considered purebred. However, purebred animals can never be registered as full-blood

MARKING—The North American Yak Registry requires a left ear tattoo and a corresponding left ear tag number issued by the Registry. This will be the same number as the registry number given to the Yak. (example: tattoo number C001, ear tag number C001, registration number FB C001 (full blood)—or PB C001 (purebred). An individual herd identifier consisting of four alphanumeric characters may also be tattooed in the Yak ear and maybe required when numbers dictate. As an example Rich is the


herd identifier of Living Diamonds Ranch. Further details of the Registry are available from IYAK.

Dr. Dane Smith has acted as the Defacto Registrar and has done a beautiful job and hopefully will be officially designated as the Registrar on September 26, 1993 at the annual membership meeting at KwaTaqNuk Resort, Polson, Montana.

Note A: In a sweeping move to implement the registry, Lawrence Richards, required all Yaks entered in YAKARAMA 93 to be registered with the NAYR. In a spirit of coopera-

tion the response has been terrific and all Yaks selling at YAKARAMA 93 have been tattooed and ear tagged with association tags. Congratulations.

Note B: The first registration number C001 has been assigned to the great foundation Royal Bull of Living Diamonds and Ranch and now owned by Brad Sprouse, Maple City, Michigan. The great bull is of course, Sargent Pepper, whose photograph must be the most distributed Yak photograph in the history of mankind.
